BURSARIES Thank you, Marilyn Godley, for the Graduate Women Victoria news regarding Nicole Holding, winner of the 2022 SWAN Bursary, who has just had her first journal article, **Prenatal Care in the Rural United States, 1912-1929,** accepted by *the Bulletin of History of Medicine*. This is what she said in response to her win:

"Throughout life I have been an avid scholar, particularly in women's studies, whether that be in the field of science or history. Initially, I started my career as a Registered Nurse, working primarily in the operating theatre and midwifery, then moving on to breast cancer research. It was when I developed cancer myself, leaving me with mobility issues, that I needed to change careers. I went back to Monash University and focused on a history major. In 2020, I completed my honours



thesis in prenatal care in the rural United States 1910-1929, in which I was lucky enough to have access to a trove of letters written by poor, rural women to the US government demanding better access to prenatal care.

The maternal and infant mortality rates in the US at that time were the highest in the industrial world and continue to this day to be among the worst. Currently, my Master's thesis expands on this topic by focusing on the faith-based practices of African American midwives and Black women in the same time period.

Despite my work focusing on the US my research and analysis is important for women of all societies, especially those living in rural areas and from minority groups. Research indicates that the monopolisation of childbirth by medical practitioners, a lack of midwifery-based care, and the undermining of women's faith in childbirth practices leads to greater birth trauma and higher death rates among mothers and babies, particularly in areas that have limited access to maternal care. I hope to continue with a PhD on birth control and abortion among African American women in the early twentieth century US. A pertinent topic considering the antiabortion laws now dominating the US. I would like to thank GWV and SWAN for this bursary."

This is particularly interesting, bearing in mind what is currently happening in Victoria with the suspension of midwifery beds in rural areas due to a shortage of midwives. (The Age, May 26.)

AND, included in the GWV news is the Marilyn Godley Scholarship which was awarded to Nicola Portnick-Hokopu, an Australian Indigenous woman, living in Melbourne. Nicola writes "I am in my final year of university studying a Bachelor of Nursing and also a single parent to two young children. In 2020, I began studying and moved with my children from my family home to be closer to my university.

Throughout the duration of my studies my children and I have overcome many adversities due to financial hardship, domestic violence and health related issues, but I have never let my grades fall below 'Distinction' and made it through my second year of university with straight 'High Distinctions'. As an Indigenous female and the first in my family to attend university, I am extremely proud and see this as a great achievement. In 2021, I applied for an opportunity at the Royal Melbourne Hospital 'student to graduate program' and I was fortunate enough to win a position, where I will be completing all remaining placements previously delayed by Covid-19 restrictions. Academically, I wish to continue my studies after a graduate year as a registered nurse and strive to achieve a role as ultimately becoming a nurse practitioner specialising in diabetes education."

EVENTS

SWAN members are contributing in various ways to the national community education program currently taking place across the nation. Two SWAN members recently facilitated an interactive and stimulating community forum at **Rye Community House** about The Uluru Statement and why a First Nations Voice to Parliament is so crucial. From the 25 who attended, it was agreed to meet again to continue to share ideas and spread the word.

Victoria's First People's Assembly Engagement Officers, STEPHANIE ROSS and ALICE UGLE, addressed **SWAN's 2022 NAIDOC meeting** with a strong focus on Victoria's nation-leading treaty authority: the *Yoorrook Justice Commission*. Treaty possibilities the speakers referred to included: an elected Black parliament empowered to make laws and policies on First People's issues; a First People's Voice to the Victorian parliament; and dedicated First People's seats in the Victorian parliament.

THE ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART

A number of SFN members have been busy printing, collating and distributing SWAN's 'Position Paper re the Constitutional Enshrinement of an Indigenous Voice' to local politicians and councillors, media and community groups, and First Nations organisations. To our Position Paper, we attached a colour print of the 'Uluru Statement from The Heart'. To help make it readable, the Uluru Statement was printed in larger font on the verso. Your assistance in sharing SWAN's Position Paper and the Uluru Statement with your own networks is vital and appreciated.
