Joan Kirner AM -September 20 Women having a voice.



Joan Kirner co-wrote with Moira Rayner, the best-selling book The Women's Power Handbook, published by Penguin in May 1999. The text gives women the tools and strategies to get, keep and use their power.

Joan Kirner is perhaps best known as Victoria's first female Premier (1990-1992). Joan was elected to Parliament in 1982. Her Ministries included Conservation, Forest & Lands, Minister for Education and Deputy Premier and during her time as Premier she held the position of Minister for Women's and Ethnic Affairs. Ms Kirner was Victoria's Opposition Leader from Octo-

ber 1992 to March 1993. She retired from Parliament in May 1994.

Ms Kirner has accepted and continues to accept many challenges. She began her lifelong involvement in education as a teacher. Her political activism within this area was as a parent at the local, state and national level. She led the charge for the representation of state school parents on the Commonwealth Schools Commission. She was a member of the School Commission from 1973-1978. In 1980 Joan Kirner was awarded an AM for her contribution to community services.

In 1986, as Minister for Conservation she developed and implemented the now internationally acclaimed Landcare program.

In March 1994 Joan Kirner began chairing the Centenary of Federation Advisory committee and held this position until the committee's Final report: "2001 - A report from Australia" was presented to the Federal Government in August 1994.

From July 1994 to December 1996, Joan was the Chair of the Employment Services Regulatory Authority (ESRA), and a member of the Board of NETTFORCE and the AIDS Trust of Australia.

In 1996 Ms Kirner established EMILY's List Australia, a political network to support the election of more progressive Labor women to Parliament. She was its Co-convenor till June 2005. Currently Joan is a member of the Board of the Museum of Victoria and has just been appointed Victoria's first Victorian Communities Ambassador. Her role is to work with Government and local communities to build stronger communities. Ms Kirner is Matron of the Women's Circus, the Living Museum of the West, Positive Women, the Women's Electoral Lobby and Domestic Violence, Victoria. She is also a patron of the Royal Victorian District Nursing Service.

Ms Kirner writes and speaks regularly on a diverse range of topics including Landcare, education, Politics, equity for women, community activism, community development and the media.



"I believe, very sincerely, that any woman entering the public arena must be prepared to work as men work; she must justify herself not as a woman, but as a citizen; she must attack the same problems, and be prepared to shoulder the same burdens." Dame Enid Lyons—maiden speech to Parliament 1943.

Bea Edwards-July Speaker

Bea works as a Drug and Alcohol Councillor, working especially with the aboriginal community on the Mornington Peninsula. She sees her work as "honouring our elders and nurturing our youth". Bea was born Toorak, and has lived in Tasmania, South Australia, Northern Victoria and Lake Tyers. At eight she was placed in a foster home, and feels she received her culture from the elders of the community. She is now an elder herself and in her time has raised twenty children who call her 'Mum'. The aboriginal community of the Peninsula numbers over 1300, 55% of whom are under 16. There are seven elders in the community. Many members of the community live a disadvantaged and transient lifestyle and suffer from sub-standard housing and drug and alcohol issues. There had been no specific indigenous medical services to address these needs. In the last 10 years the counselling service has grown from just Bea to ten workers who try to address the problem through education about diet, stress in lifestyle, and by changing the culture to appreciate the spiritual connection to place. After the death of Bea's mother and a family rift she found strength and healing through painting. Her vibrant paintings expressed her grief, and her passion for life found new expression on canvas.

Bea feels that since 1967, with government recognition of the aboriginal community, education about aboriginal culture has been very important, allowing the spiritual journey to be taught and leading to rebuilding and a greater fulfilment in the aboriginal community. It is vital that this support continues, along with training for community finance, and business skills.









- Victoria 's 42nd Premier and first female Premier 1990-1992
