SWAN Speaker Event: NAIDOC Week

At SWAN's July Speaker Meeting, members acknowledged and celebrated NAIDOC WEEK 2024 with guest speaker **Jillian West**, a proud Bunurong woman from Point Nepean and Palawa from the Islands of the Bass Strait.

TRANSFORMATION THROUGH TRUTH AND RESPECT

We sat facing one another. Jillian highlighted how this way of coming together signifies the Indigenous 'yarning circle'. Jillian spoke highly of her late father Japanangka Errol West who rose from poverty and a Grade 5 education to achieving a PHD. Reiterating her dad's philosphy, Jillian conveyed the importance of 'teaching people respect, love and truth' in a journey of walking together, of being allies. In this sense, education features in Jillian's focus for positive change, especially CULTURE 'IN' EDUCATION for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians. 'Now more than ever ... we have a cultural obligation to understand, accept and connect'. Jillian explained how her career centres on closing the gap via self-determination – by fostering community networks and in mentoring First Nations people for sustainable employment and in cultivating their life's purpose.



Before our Q&A where an **Indigenous 'talking stick'** was respectfully handed to each person who had a question, Jillian invited **Aunty Deb Mellett**, the General Manager of Nairm Marr Djambana Aboriginal Gathering Place to speak. Aunty Deb thanked those involved in the 'VOTE YES' VOICE campaign on the Mornington Peninsula and said how this year's NAIDOC theme '*Keep the Fire Burning'* is a direct response to the Referendum results and the enduring intergenerational trauma associated with colonisation.

Both speakers told of how **Indigenous women had been kidnapped by non-Indigenous sealers** from a beach near Point Nepean and taken to the islands in the Bass Strait where they were treated like slaves and forbidden to speak their language or engage in traditional cultural practices. They spoke too about the **massacres at Boona-djalang (Point Nepean)**, a sacred site for birthing and maternity practices.

To end our meeting, a proposal was made for a 'Women's Gathering' led by Jillian.

Jillian gifted her \$200 donation from SWAN to **DJIRRA**, a comprehensive domestic violence support service for First Nations Women and Children. Thank you to our raffle sponsors, Nairm Marr Djambana Frankston and Higher Ground Café Mt Martha, and to Secret Garden Mornington for flowers for our speaker.

The SWAN Women for Housing Justice group is continuing to advocate for Zero Homelessness on the Mornington Peninsula. The situation is urgent.

On July 23, several members met with **Liberal member for Mornington Chris Crewther MP** to discuss the local housing and homelessness crisis. We discussed our advocacy campaign and our efforts to meet with Housing Minister Harriet Shing MP and to get her to personally visit the Peninsula.

We also discussed some of Chris' potential solutions such as tiny houses supported by government incentives and a Room2Share option, matching young people needing a room with vacant rooms in local homes. We gained his commitment to support our aim to schedule a broad-based, non-political action-oriented meeting with community leaders to discuss further potential solutions. We also asked him to assist with our advocacy by utilising some of his allocated time to speak in Parliament to highlight the critical issues on the Peninsula, including how taking action will benefit the economy in the long term.

You may have read our recent media releases and letters in the Mornington Peninsula News (July 10: July 17), including our advocacy meeting with Labor member Tom McIntosh MP.

our representative in the Victorian Legislative Council. He expressed concern and commitment to follow-up on issues below with relevant Ministers:

- a) the urgent need for extra funding for our 3 Community Support Centres;
- b) funding for Mornington Peninsula's only Homeless Outreach Worker;
- c) funds to employ more housing workers given the ever-increasing number of people sleeping rough;
- d) urgent repair and refurbishment of the many empty public housing buildings (there are 600 on the Mornington Peninsula); and
- e) support for a solution to the likely closure of 'The Ranch' which provides crisis accommodation.


Our advocacy continues – next up Jodie Belyea and hopefully Harriet Shing!

- Scheduled meeting with Jodie Belyea MP Federal Member for Dunkley on August 27.
- Awaiting a date from Victorian Minister for Housing Harriet Shing MP to visit the Mornington Peninsula to meet key local people here in her own electorate engaged in the housing and homelessness support sector.
- Meetings requested with Sam Groth MP Nepean in the Victorian Government and Zoe McKenzie MP Federal member for Flinders.

During Homelessness Week, call into your local Community House, Library, Youth Hub or Shire office to fold an origami house for the Houses at Parliament Campaign. The aim is to fold 4,000 origami houses to represent those waiting for social housing. At 'Fair Share' Mornington Park on August 9, postcards will be handed out for people to fill in and send to politicians to alert them to this escalating crisis


NAIDOC WEEK 7 - 14 JULY, 2024 'Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud and Proud'

'NAIDOC stands for National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee. Its origins can be traced to the emergence of Aboriginal groups in the 1920's which sought to increase awareness in the wider community of the status and treatment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians.'

NAIDOC Week provided a significant opportunity for us all to celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The theme for 2024 is 'Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud and Proud' to celebrate resilience and unity in a fire symbol of connection to Country, to each other and to a rich cultural tapestry of traditions that define First Nations.

SWAN members attended several NAIDOC WEEK celebrations held across the Mornington Peninsula and in Frankston, including flag raising at Willum

Warrain and at Nairm Marr Djambana, as well as Nairm's family day and annual NAIDOC dinner dance, Our Songlines Tree Planting, and NAIDOC Fest at Flinders.

POSSUM SKIN CLOAK, Baluk Arts 2024

A special NAIDOC WEEK event at Baluk Arts brought to the fore a collaborative project of creating a possum skin cloak. Uncle Lionel Lauch from Living Culture sounded the powerful vibrations of the yidaki (didgeridoo), marking the event's commencement and bringing everyone together, followed by a cleansing smoking ceremony and Welcome to Country by Josh West from Bunurong Land Council who spoke about the strength of moving forward together, of keeping the fire burning. Aunty Yvonne Luke along with the gallery's Program Coordinator Tabatha Glanville and Taungurung artist and project director Iluka Sax-Williams introduced the artists involved and the story and process behind this precious artefact.

'When Aboriginal children are born in the South Eastern Region, they are swaddled with a possum skin. As the child grows, more skins are sewn on; a ritual that continues until they pass into Dreaming. Cloaks can gather more than sixty skins over a person's lifetime. It becomes kin to the owner. Culturally marking onto skins was traditionally done with shell edges, kangaroo incisors, or sharp bone. In the contemporary, cultural practitioners use pyrography pens.'

NAIDOC FEST at FLINDERS a community event sponsored by MPSC, was a truly joyous occasion that brought together local First Peoples and allies in strength and love. A talented Aboriginal dance troupe performed a fusion of hip hop, rap and traditional



Aboriginal dance and had everyone up out of their seats, having fun and moving under their skilled guidance. A beautiful array of crafts and goods by local Mornington Peninsula First Nations' stall holders also featured, along with the launch of Baluk Arts 'Kulin Seasonal Dial', a public sculpture by Iluka Sax-Williams, proud Taungurung man. This stunning sculpture in the form of a sun-dial provides 16 totemic seasonal representations of the Winter and Summer solstices and marks the cross-cultural kinship between Victoria's Kulin and Tasmania's Palawa peoples. A collaborative work led by Iluka with other artists from Baluk Arts, 'Kulin

Seasonal Dial' is currently on display at **Baluk Arts** in Mt Eliza. Festival goers were well satiated by delicious native-inspired canapes on offer, along with plenty of hot tea, coffee and chocolate to warm up with.



INDIGENOUS LITERACY DAY

As we approach one year since the Voice to Parliament referendum, Thomas Mayo reflects on what's next for reconciliation in Australia.



At this special event on <u>Indigenous Literacy Day</u>, activist Thomas Mayo will share a powerful address reflecting on the ongoing fight for justice for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the wake of the failed Voice to Parliament referendum.

Mayo will draw on the messages outlined in his new book, *Always Was, Always Will Be: The Campaign for Justice and Recognition Continues*, which maps the path forward for Indigenous and non-Indigenous supporters of the Voice towards a better future for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Then, Mayo will be joined by a commissioner from the Yoorrook Justice Commmission, the first formal truth-telling process into injustices experienced by First Peoples in Victoria, to discuss pathways to treaty and how we can renew the momentum of reconciliation in Australia.
