Patrick Binyon	Brokil		Currently the Council is updating the 2020-2022 Reconciliation Action Plan. Increasing funding for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander festivals is an action that I would support. Updating signs and information boards is cost effective and promotes the use of local indigenous language across the community. This year we have indigenous names for the electoral wards, and these can be included on the town signs along the Peninsula. I would support initiatives that improve access to Willum Warrain for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people living on the southern region of the Peninsula, such as free transport or shuttle buses. The median age of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders on the Mornington Peninsula is 23. This age bracket should be supported with increased inter-

		connection opportunities, leadership programs and access to employment services and pathways. I would support increased Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders representation on Council.

Continued engagement with and support of the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Calendar, and consistent funding to increase Aboriginal community awareness initiatives.

Barry Besanko	Tanti	I have always considered education of all things historical would be a great way to bridge the gap and way we all think about native heritage. Via good educational programs around history of our First Nations communities.
Nick Fallaw	Tanti	I will support greater integration if indigenous teaching on the peninsula especially as it relates to youth in the education sphere.

Paul Pingiaro	Tanti	Respect for the cultural heritage of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people is an important part of our shared history on the Mornington Peninsula. While opinions on specific policies may vary, I believe we can take a balanced approach that honors and acknowledges this rich heritage without imposing views on others. One way the Council can help is by creating opportunities for learning and voluntary participation, such as offering optional workshops, community events, and information sessions. This would provide residents who are interested with the chance to engage and deepen their understanding of local Indigenous culture at their own pace. I, for one, would love to know more about the local edible and herbal plants! We can also consider incorporating information about Aboriginal heritage into public spaces, (As i do within my business) allowing people to naturally encounter and appreciate it in everyday life. The goal is to promote awareness and respect in a way that is inclusive and unforced, ensuring that everyone feels comfortable while still recognising the importance of the Peninsula's Indigenous history.

Expand the Victorian Stolen Generations Reparations Package to include people removed from their families after 1976 and compensate families of deceased people who would have been eligible for compensation under the scheme. Acknowledge the Indigenous Stolen Wages Preliminary Investigation and establish a scheme to make payments to workers and the families of deceased workers who had wages stolen or withheld. Further develop the curriculum so that Victorian students are taught about the systemic injustices perpetrated against First Nations people. Fund schools to teach Aboriginal languages. Provide targeted spending to rapidly equalise the health, education and economic outcomes of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people. Increase access to legal, health and social support services. Protect cultural rights and provide greater support to retain and restore culture and languages lost due to colonisation and genocide, including by supporting First Nations people to live or spend time on

		country. Recognise January 26 as Invasion Day. Implement all recommendations of the Royal Commission into Aboriginal Deaths in Custody. Implement all recommendations of the Bringing them Home Report.
