SWAN New Year Message from our Facilitator

Onwards and Upwards!

I hope you enjoyed a relaxing break after a dynamic *finale* to SWAN activities late last year! This began with the launch of our new bursary for local secondary school students in mid-November (see p.8) and was followed a few days later when Prof. Helen Keleher gave a powerful address at our General Meeting on the prevention of family violence. Next up, the SWAN Women against Gender-based Violence group facilitated a successful public address and walk down Main St, Mornington to raise community awareness about the urgent need to Stop the Violence (see p.4). To cap it off the SWAN Women for Housing Justice group conducted a roundtable with around 40 community leaders concerning the escalating housing and homelessness crisis on the Mornington Peninsula (see p.6). My hearty congratulations to all those who contributed to organising and conducting these noteworthy events.

Without doubt SWAN is making its mark, raising important justice and equity concerns and fulfilling its goal of supporting women to play an active role in our community. In mid-January, the SWAN Committee met to reflect on what's been done so far and discuss priorities for the coming year. High on the list was our commitment to continue to implement a range of strategies to promote SWAN more widely to reach a diverse range of local women. This includes further enhancing our website and social media platforms; increasing our presence in mainstream media; and broadening the variety of ways that people can engage with SWAN. The valuable work done last year to develop a common brand for all our marketing materials is helping to lift our profile.

A sizable number of new members have joined SWAN in the past two years, many of whom were attracted by the community awareness raising activities we undertook in the lead up to the Voice Referendum and more recently concerning homelessness and gender-based violence. In 2025 we will introduce strategies to help those new to SWAN to connect with our wider membership and to join our various working groups and advocacy activities if they want to. As is the case for all SWAN members, we're keen to hear about their interests and ideas and draw on their experience and skills.

Committee members reaffirmed our commitment to continue to provide a welcoming, apolitical forum where like-minded women of all ages and personal backgrounds can meet to learn about and discuss current social justice issues. Efforts are well underway to attract experienced speakers on contemporary topics of especial interest. This year, in response to member requests, we are also hosting several skills development workshops. These will be held on Sunday 30 March and led by women with expertise in the following areas: a) Strategies to write letters to the editor and media articles that *will* be published; b) Engaging effectively with local members and politicians about a social justice concern; and c) Using social media safely and most effectively.

Later in the year, Jillian West will conduct a Cultural Awareness workshop to help to help develop our understanding of Bunurong cultural heritage and strategies to support Aboriginal

and Torres Strait Islander advocacy and projects in our region and beyond. Further details about these workshops will be circulated in the coming weeks.

Finally, in the next couple of months we will 'kick-start' initial discussions to generate ideas on how best to celebrate and commemorate SWAN's 30th anniversary that is scheduled to take place at the end of 2026. This is a most significant occasion, especially given SWAN's unique history as one of, if not, *the* longest running voluntary community organisation (that has retained its original structure) for women in the nation.



SWAN MARCH Against Gendered Violence makes a noise!

On Sunday 1st December 2024, Mornington Park came alive with a gathering of over 100 people in support of '16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence'. The morning began with SWAN Facilitator Diane McDonald introducing proceedings, then a beautiful Welcome to Country by proud Bunurong and Palawa woman Jillian West, followed by impassioned speeches by Domestic Violence Survivor Bronwyn Currie and Anti-Violence Activist Prof Helen Keleher. From Mornington Park, down one side of Main St to the Clock Tower, and returning to the Park down the opposite side of Main St, supporters carried placards, wore orange (including their dogs!), chanted and marched to applause and cheers from shoppers and café-goers. Instigated by SWAN, preparations for the march involved liaison with a range of organisations including Respect Victoria, Mornington Shire Council, and Rye Community House. An annual global campaign against gender-based violence, '16 Days of Activism' commenced on International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women (Nov 25) and finished on Human Rights Day (Dec 10).

Theme for 2024 was: 'RESPECT IS ...'

- Orange is the theme colour for activism against gender-based violence.
- Women on the Mornington Peninsula experience higher rates of gender-based violence compared to metropolitan Melbourne.
- Australia-wide, 1 in 3 women experience gender-based violence during their lifetime.

Gender-based violence is often an isolating experience, encompassing physical, emotional, psychological, sexual, and/or financial abuse, happening behind closed doors, in homes, in workplaces, and in public spaces, explained victim-survivor Bronwyn Currie. Bronwyn's disclosure of her personal story was powerfully felt by the crowd. Good Shepherd family violence specialists were on hand for those adversely affected by the event.

The march called for all levels of government to take action and for each and every one of us – 'men, women and children, ... governments, businesses, communities and individuals to unite to create a world where women and girls are safe, respected, valued and equal' advocated Bronwyn.

After much planning, lobbying and patience, SWAN Women for Housing Justice (SW4HJ) successfully hosted a Housing Roundtable Forum on Wednesday 11th December 2024 attended by the Minister for Housing of Victoria, the Hon Harriet Shing MP, along with around forty politicians and Mornington Peninsula community leaders. The Roundtable was held at the Shire's old Council meeting room.

This meeting created an opportunity for leading local professionals and decision-makers to raise awareness, share solutions and inform the Minister of both what we can do and also what support we need from the State Government to address the housing and homelessness crisis on the Mornington Peninsula. The forum was facilitated pro-bono by Georgie Swan from Right Lane Consulting.

Diane McDonald, SWAN Facilitator welcomed all, acknowledged the importance of the meeting, and gave a brief overview of SWAN and our current aim of advocating for solutions to the housing and homelessness crisis.

Judith Graley then spoke about SWAN's housing and homelessness campaign — 'SWAN Women for Housing Justice Group' - and the terrible news that one of our community members had recently died on the foreshore. Judith stressed the need for housing for women and children in particular, and spoke of the many meetings the group has had with politicians with a responsibility for the area, including Federal Minister for Housing and Homelessness, Clare O'Neil.

Minister Shing then outlined some of the issues and the Government policies currently being utilised to address them. She said the aim is to ensure that homelessness is rare, brief and non-repeating, and with home ownership as the goal.

There were then a series of presentations from speakers who represent a broad cross section of the community sector on the Mornington Peninsula.

The Minister thanked everyone for their contributions with the comment "Thank you for your candour". After the Minister departed, the forum continued with a number of other speakers providing further information, issues and solutions. The session concluded with a commitment to continue with the collaboration.

SW4HJ received great feedback from many participants such as from Elaine Franklin, President, Lions Club of Flinders District Inc who said:

"It was a very interesting, informative meeting, and I feel Harriet is now well aware of the number of action groups on the Peninsula who care so deeply about the issues. I think the fact that a homeless man died in a tent on the foreshore will resonate with everyone for all the reasons we discussed. It was a great opportunity to meet so many other community minded people, and I really appreciated the opportunity".

The SWAN W4HJ Group is currently reconvening to take matters forward. The Minister has been provided with all the submissions from the local organisations for her attention and action. A high level representative from Homes Victoria was also present and will report back to the Minister.

All submissions and a full summary of discussions on the day will be available on SWAN's website.

A Beacon of Hope for the Future

Congratulations to our inaugural SWAN Bursary recipients: Year 11 students **Jenna Chalkitis** from Western Port Secondary College (WPSC) and **Murphy Clarke** from Rosebud Secondary College (RSC). As reported in SWAN NEWS (*December 2024*), SWAN's new bursary the 'Val McKenna Young Women's Advocacy Award' was launched in November 2024. Valued at \$500, the bursary is awarded to senior level female students at local Secondary Schools who show leadership potential and interest in social justice, equity and human rights.

SWAN Facilitator Diane McDonald and SWAN founding member Judith Graley attended the WPSC Presentation Night. They were warmly welcomed by the School Principal and staff who expressed strong interest in building a relationship with SWAN to support the School's commitment to social justice. Diane presented the bursary to Jenna who is described by her teachers as follows:

'Jenna has strong leadership skills on social justice issues and a passion to make the school more inclusive place. She was vocal in supporting the Voice to Parliament which was especially relevant to our school cohort with 9% of our school population identifying as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander. Jenna also actively supports the diversity of our school population and encourages students from different cultural backgrounds to be part of our student voice'.

SWAN members Susan Blackburn and Lyn Jones will oversee ongoing bursary development.



26 JANUARY 2025: ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDERS'
SURVIVAL DAY 'REIGNITE OUR SPIRIT'

Our Songlines successfully held an inclusive and uplifting event for Survival Day 2025. Indigenous and non-Indigenous people came together to listen, share stories, dance, picnic, reflect and celebrate, strengthening ties and re-affirming the path forward for Voice, Treaty, Truth. Highlights included the soulful Emma Donovan,



Djarlo Dance Troupe's electric performance, and Denni, who attracted a huge crowd for her Indigenous movement meditation.

At the 'Yarning Circle', Thomas Mayo reflected on the journey of the 'Uluru Statement from the Heart' since the rejection of a 'Voice to Parliament'. 'As we move forward, it's important to keep in mind the 60% support we received ... (and) continue to believe, front up, listen, know who to walk away from – racists, bigots, timewasters – and know who to share the truth with'. Thomas urged that despite current challenges with political opportunism, social media disinformation, and Trumpism, 'We will succeed ... you have to find your source of hope and pass that onto others'.
