Council Cuts

Do you care about arts, culture, climate change, indigenous rights, social justice, good governance and transparency in political activities?

As a SWAN member - the answer is most likely a very big YES!

Firstly, there was the Council's decision on 29 April to rescind the **Climate Emergency Declaration** and the associated **Climate Emergency Plan (CEP) 2020-2030**, which was significantly supported by 92% of Mornington Peninsula residents when introduced in 2019.

At their meeting on Tuesday 6 May, the Council then made sweeping changes to the Shire's grants and subsidies program, which has resulted in many other community-led programs losing their funding and/or MPS support including Friends of Lospalos and Willum Warrain Aboriginal Association. Willum Warrain's funding for an inclusion grant of \$103,000.00 was terminated for the FY 2025/26 budget and Lospalos' annual funding of \$9000 was also rescinded for the FY 2025/26. There's a \$480K cut in funding to the Performing Arts Development Fund and the Creative Fund from the Community Investment Fund for the FY 2025/26 - this is funding that supports new theatre work, creates albums, makes films, supports writers and a range of creative practices across the Peninsula. The cuts will have a significant impact on Willum Warrain's operations and result in the removal of Lospalos' scholarship program for teacher training, as well as impacting the support of artists and performers, who are mostly sole traders and/or small businesses that keep the creative wheels spinning locally.

Many SWAN members have already been corresponding with and attending meetings with other community groups, writing to Councillors and the Mornington Peninsula News, and attended the protest cross-group rally at the Council meeting on 20 May: https://www.facebook.com/share/r/19Eq1w2Ho4/

SWAN Speaker: Cyanna McClaren Women and Mentoring: Young Women's Program'

Cyanna McLaren, Co-ordinator of the Women & Mentoring (WAM) Young Women's Program in the Frankston, Mornington Peninsula, Dandenong and Casey communities, presented on how and why the program is an effective strategy for empowering at-risk 12-24 year old cisgender women, transgender women, and non-binary people. WAM matches participants (mentees) with a trained volunteer mentor, including participants in the early stages of contact with the criminal justice system. Participants come from a range of backgrounds - predominantly low socio-economic and experience multifactor needs and issues, such as childhood trauma, social isolation, and real and perceived societal judgement. For example, 95% of participants have lived experience of the complexities of family violence.

WAM commenced in 2009, uses an *empowerment model* for both mentor and mentee where the mentoring relationship is 'guided by goals, grounded in growth'. The mentor-mentee relationship extends over a year, is primarily about the participant being validated and feeling safe and supported, and centres on empowering the mentee in creating sustainable relationships. Mentors are trained, appropriately matched and guided by WAM staff and also engage in peer support. Importantly, Cyanna emphasised that the mentoring relationship is not one-way but a reciprocal, mutually beneficial relationship. About the program, Cyanna stated:

'While goals provide structure, growth often happens beyond them – in small changes to how a young person sees themselves, connects with others, or navigates challenges. Progress may not always be linear or easily measured, but it is deeply significant'.


In particular, Cyanna clarified what Mentors CAN and CAN'T do, for example:

<u>CAN'T:</u> 'Mentors are not case workers and do not replace professional services'. WAM staff and mentors network with specialised supports to put these in place if needed.

<u>CAN:</u> 'Mentors can provide support to mentees applying for jobs and re-engaging in education'.

Further, Cyanna explained how the WAM program gives mentors 'a trauma-aware perspective that can be carried into future professional contexts', particularly when matching participants with university students who are studying in the areas of social work, psychology, teaching, or criminology.

Cyanna's own background in criminology and experience with intensive case management, family violence response, and early intervention programs, brings a trauma-informed, relational approach to supporting young women and strengthening community responses. Cyanna's deep engagement in strategic community collaboration to address gendered inequalities and her active contribution to advisory networks, assists in ensuring young women's lived experiences remain at the centre of conversations about systemic change.

SWAN Women for Housing Justice: Update

The SW4HJ continues to progress our advocacy and now that the election and federal government leadership has been decided, we are seizing the opportunity presented by Flinders no longer being a safe seat, to try to get a much stronger focus on the local homelessness and housing crisis. The aim is to not only keep the issues out there in the public domain but also continue our pressure for better funding of much needed facilities and services. We have plans for a new round of meetings with elected representatives and stakeholders. In addition to following up on community submissions and the promises Minister Shing made at the Round Table, we have exciting plans for upcoming activities, including planning a trip to Canberra to meet with stakeholders (watch this space!).

The group has also contacted all Roundtable attendees and provided them with the latest correspondence from Minister Shing and a copy of a letter we have sent to the Minister regarding the unacceptable situation at 335 Main Street Mornington. It is hoped that our suggestion of working with the Shire and a notable social housing provider will provide a good solution to the current state of housing at that location. There is the opportunity to turn 16 units (only 12 currently in use) into 70 new units.

The good news is that a few positive outcomes have started to eventuate including this one:

Community Housing for Women & Children in Rosebud - HAVE YOUR SAY



The MPSC is supporting the development of a women's housing project to be located on shire owned land in Rosebud. SW4HJ is very positive about this initiative that aims to provide safe, stable, and affordable medium-term housing for low-income women and their children, as well as women at risk of homelessness aged 55 and over, to help them transition to permanent housing.




SWAN Women Against Gender-based Violence




